Once Angelo Battisti, a spiritual son of Padre Pio and the administrator of the Home for the Relief of Suffering, asked Padre Pio: "How do you manage to remember everyone who turns to you, all those who come

to visit you and all those who ask for your help from distant places?" "I suppose," he continued, " that you must remember them all generally in a common intention as if you placed them in a large cauldron...?" Padre Pio looked him from head to foot and with a smile said to him: "I will throw you into the cauldron! I remember them each by name, I count the number of their hairs and more..."

This is the greatness of the saints. They have the capacity to love every single soul that is entrusted to them.

And this great capacity to love is infinitely greater in God, who as the Good Shepherd, when He loses one of His sheep leaves the ninetynine to go in search of it and having found it proclaims: "Rejoice with me, for I have found the sheep which was lost...there is more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety—nine righteous persons who need no repentance".
