Padre Pio was and continues to be a man who is close to mankind, a generous intercessor of 'God's caress' of mercy. Yesterday, it was from his confessional. Today, instead, he 'speaks' to us from his glorious tomb, to all those many men and women who still wish to do their part, with passion and fervour, in the Lord's vineyard. Do you wish to be included among those many, but always too few? ....if you do, you will attain much more than mere emotions!
